

Bouquet Dill

This dill variety is easy to grow and makes a valuable addition to any garden or home. It has larger flowers and seed heads than some other varieties, as well as fuller leaves. It has a compact size but very productive growth. This variety is ideal for pickling, garnishes, and drying. These seeds are certified organic.

To use: Direct sow in spring and in fall, as soon as the soil can be worked. Dill seeds need light to germinate, so press the seeds gently just below the soil surface. Water after planting. Space plants 4–10 inches apart and provide full sun. Seedlings emerge in 7–21 days. Late fall sowings will emerge in very early spring. To harvest, snip off the leaves and flowers anytime. Dill seeds can be used in cooking when they are fresh, or dried to use as a spice. Dill leaves can be used fresh or frozen for later use; they do, however, lose some flavor when dried. Dill self-sows in mild climates. Ideal soil temp: 60–75°F. To collect seeds, let the plant mature, flower, and turn to seedheads. Cut the dry flowers/seedheads and collect seeds. Store in a cool, dark place until ready for planting.
